### **War Memorial**

The Hunton War memorial will shortly be undergoing a facelift. Over the passage of time, the lettering has faded badly and was clearly in need of attention. Its has taken some time to find a company with the right skills to carry out this work and the PC would like to thank Steve Tock for his efforts in finding a suitable monumental mason. The works will include a thorough clean of the monument and the refurbishing of all the lettering. It is hoped to have the works completed before the Remembrance Day Service, on Sunday 13th November.

# Play Area Footbridge

As part of the ongoing maintenance and upkeep of the Play Area, the PC have started a project to replace the wooden footbridge which links the two sides of the area.

The original footbridge was constructed as a 'self help' project by villagers in the early nineties. It has lasted well but has reached the point where it requires replacement. A number of areas of concern have been highlighted in the annual play area inspection report.

The plan is to replace the bridge with a similar design, albeit a bit wider to allow easier access for parents with children and buggies. The first task is to raise sufficient finance to allow the work to go ahead as we are looking at a potential final cost of circa £11,000. A number of funding applications have been submitted and we should have a decision on the main sources of funding by the end of the month.

Once funding is secured, the bridge can be ordered and we would be looking to install in March 2023.

Because of the location of the bridge and access we are looking to purchase the bridge in kit form, which can be self assembled. Once details are finalised, we are hoping to construct the foundations and install using local contractors and also some self help work to minimise the costs. The removal of the old bridge will hopefully be done by volunteers armed with chainsaws and the like. More to follow on this nearer the time.

### Pollution in the Beck

The Parish Council were made aware of a potential pollution incident in the beck. We have advised both the Environment Agency and Richmondshire District Council of the incident and they are investigating the matter. The incident is not thought to be serious and has been compounded by the very low water levels.

# Village Work Day

It's that time again! The PC will be looking to hold a village work day on Saturday 29th October. Weather permitting, we would ask volunteers to meet at the Village Hall from 10.00am. The main tasks will be clearance of vegetation and pruning along the side of the beck between Captain's Bridge and the Ford. We will also be looking to tidy up the large conifers adjacent to the war memorial. The previous workdays have been well supported and all help to maintain the look and feel of the village. Please come along and support armed with shears, loppers etc.

## Rights of Way (footpaths and bridleways).

The Parish Council website has a link to the NYCC map of all the Definitive Rights of Way around Hunton. If you unsure of where you are permitted to walk or ride, go to huntonpc.org 'Community' then 'Public Rights of Way' where you will find a link to the map to check this

Two parish councillors have walked 3 footpaths to the east and north of the village and have identified 2 stiles which are not suitable to use and 2 stiles/way marks which are missing. This may lead to walkers straying onto private land. A map showing the stiles, or lack of them, and description is being sent to NYCC Rights of Way, with a request to check the state of these.

### Road Closure A684

The A684 will be closed between the Patrick Brompton and Harmby junctions for 5 working days starting on 24th Oct. for drainage work and tree maintenance. The road will not be open to traffic out of hours. The full NYCC letter/map are on huntonpc.org Home page.

# Wildlife/wildflower update

In 2020 we sought permission from the Parish Council to create a wilder area in a corner by Captain's Bridge. Having been given the go ahead, we started this project early in 2020 with 'Phase 1', by Captain's Bridge, scalping the grass off and sowing with cornfield annuals. That year, we made a circular area bordered with recycled plastic 'kerb stones' around six small apple trees near the main play area, which have a mix of cottage garden plants and grass paths.

A second area was started in 2021 around a small oak tree behind the village hall. In the first year the cleared spaces were sown with annuals, with some native perennials.

This autumn, in Phase 1, we are digging out large areas of perennials (which are being transplanted in a landowner's hedge line and along the beck), and are busy creating areas of disturbed soil, which will be re-sown with poppies, cornflowers, corn marigold and corn camomile seeds.

There are also primroses along the bank, plus bluebells and cyclamen under trees and by the bench in Phase 1. In Phase 2 there are cowslips under the small oak tree and English bluebells under the large sycamore. As part of our aim to encourage wildlife into the centre of the village, there are ten bird bird boxes in the trees along the beck. Some were occupied this year. Many other species frequent the area - we've seen short tailed voles, toads, seed eating birds, thrushes and blackbirds finding food in the drought. We have been able to buy seeds and bulbs, kerb 'stones' and a bench through fundraising events over the three years.

# Leyburn PROBUS Club

At a loose end on a Tuesday Morning? Then why not come along and join us at Leyburn PROBUS club. The club meets fortnightly on a Tuesday between 10.30 and 12.00 at the Leyburn Arts Centre. PROBUS is open to all and was originally set up as a meeting point

for retired and semi-retired individuals. As well as a social gathering, the main part of the meeting is a guest speaker and during the course of the year they cover a wide variety of topics.
