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Dog Bins

A 3rd dog waste bin has been installed near the quoits pitch. These are emptied regularly, with black bin waste, by RDC.

Dogs and livestock. Lambing season.

As part of regular police reports, our local police officer requests the following be communicated: 'Could I take this opportunity to remind residents that when walking their dogs near or on farmland where there is livestock, especially during lambing season, please keep your dogs on a lead. Please berespectful to your local farmers.'

Dogs defecting on the village green areas.

The small area of green, opposite and behind the village hall (with oak tree and wildflowers) and grass by the footpath, has been fouled by dogs 3 times in recent weeks and residents of nearby houses have had to clean up the mess.

Polite reminder:

No Dogs are allowed on the grassed areas.

Please pass this on to anyone else walking your dogs.

Toxocariasis is caused by roundworm parasites and can cause blindness in humans, from handling soil or sand contaminated with infected animal faeces. The parasite can live in the soil for a decade, which is why the dog-free play area is so important for our children to play safely on.

Recycling Centre

Thank you to all who have been flattening cardboard boxes. This makes an enormous difference to the volume of cardboard that can be accommodated in the two bins and is helpful to other residents and to RDC who have increased collections to help with demand.

Woodland at Crossways

Many of you will have noticed the arrival of a forest of green plastic tubes on the slope behind Crossways at the western edge of the village. They contain a mixture of 2500 native deciduous trees, largely Oak but also Silver Birch,Field Maple, Rowan, Crab Apple and many more. There are also a few Scot's Pine and Holly to provide some year round interest.

We planted them with the help of The Woodland Trust using a scheme called More Woods; they provided a generous grant covering 70% of the cost of the trees and the planting. They also put us in touch with a local forestry advisor to help with planning and organised the contractors to plant the trees. The Woodland Trust are hoping to have planted 50 million trees over the next 5 years in a bid to help tackle the climate crisis. We are pleased to have been able to do our



bit to help. The trees will also benefit wildlife and hopefully help with flood mitigation.

We plan to hold an open day at some point when the Covid situation has improved and would love you to come and have a look for yourself. In the meantime, there will be a competition to name the new woodland. If you have a suggestion for a name, please drop it (with your name and contact) into Claire's postbox at Crossways. Closing date is 16th April and there will be a small prize - a book on trees - suitable for any age group. The Seaborne family will choose from the selection and, should there be more than one identical winning suggestion, the final choice will be pulled from 'a hat'.

There has been some early interest from small songbirds in the 11 bird boxes on the green area.

The two areas of wildflowers have been reseeded this spring, and hopefully will make a good show later in the season.

Rats

This has been a particularly bad year, with residents reporting increased sightings in gardens during a mild winter, followed by a late cold snap resulting in more rats around properties, where they may be attracted to undisturbed outbuildings.

We rely on local livestock farmers to keep populations in check, but, as residents, when feeding wild birds please try to minimise food waste on the ground. It is not a good idea to throw bread on the ground or on walls for birds; hanging seed feeders and bird tables keep the food up high and minimal wastage can be swept up. Animal feed in sheds need to be in secure containers if rats are to be discouraged. As spring progresses, rats tend to move back to the fields.
